



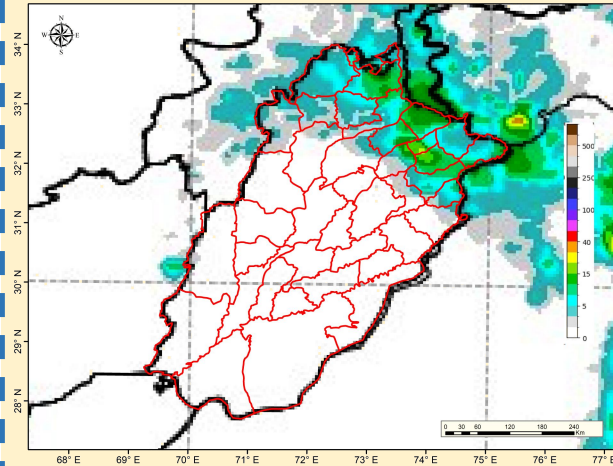

MAXIMUM PRECIPITATION (mm) LAST 24 HOURS

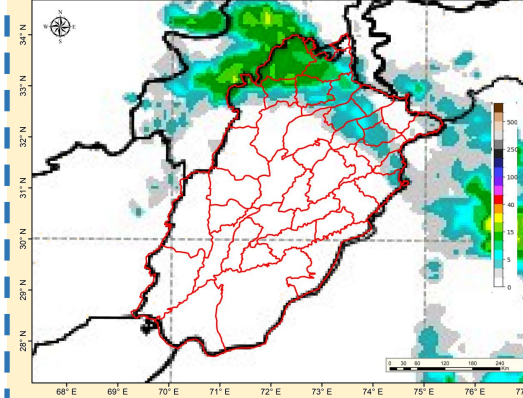

MAXIMUM PRECIPITATION (mm) NEXT 24 HOURS

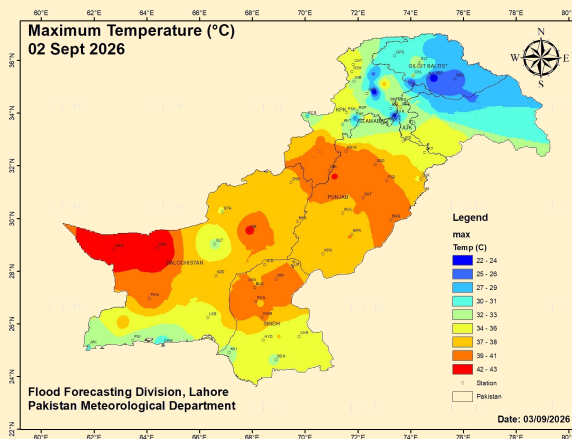


WEATHER FORECAST (24 HOURS)

- However, partly cloudy weather with rain-wind/thundershowers is likely in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galliyat, Jhelum, Chakwal, Talagang, Attock, Lahore, Sialkot, Sheikhpura, Narowal, Mandi Bahaudin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Wazirabad, Hafizabad, Kasur.
- Isolated heavyfalls may also occur during evening/night.

- All the Rivers are flowing within normal limits.

WEATHER ADVISORY - MONSOON

RAIN-WIND/THUNDER SHOWER PREDICTED IN THE UPPER PARTS OF THE COUNTRY

According to MET Department, Monsoon currents are penetrating upper of the country. A westerly wave is also likely to approach upper parts of the country from 31st August and may persist till 5th September. Under the influence of this weather system:

- Rain-wind/thundershower (with isolated heavyfalls) is expected in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galliyat, Jhelum, Chakwal, Talagang, Attock, Lahore, Sialkot, Sheikhpura, Narowal, Mandi Bahauddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Wazirabad and Hafizabad from 29th August to 5th September, while in Kasur, Okara, Nankana Sahib, Sargodha, Khushab, Mianwali, Noorpur Thal, Faisalabad, Jhang, Toba Tek Singh, Layyah, Bhakkar, Sahiwal and Pakpattan from 1st September to 5th September with occasional gaps.

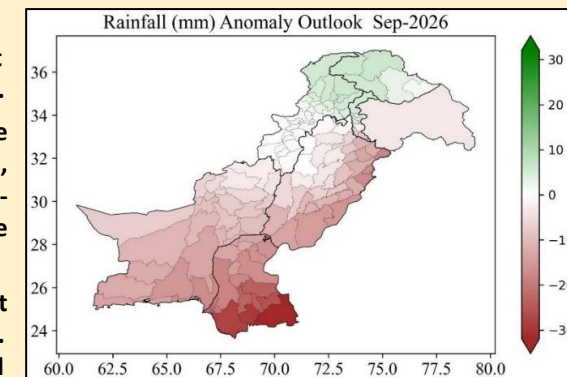
IMPACTS & PREVENTIVE MEASURES

- Heavy rains may cause Urban flooding in low lying areas of Rawalpindi, Gujranwala, Gujrat, Sialkot and Lahore from 31st August to 5th September.
- Heavy rain may cause flash flooding in local streams/ Nullahs in Kashmir, Murree, Galliyat, and Rawalpindi during the forecast period.
- Landslides may occur in hilly areas of Murree and Galliyat during the forecast period.
- Tourists and travelers are advised to remain cautious during the forecast period.
- Farmers are advised to manage their crop activities keeping in view the weather conditions.

MONTHLY RAINFALL OUTLOOK - SEPTEMBER

According to Met Department;

- Below-normal rainfall is expected over most parts of the country during September 2026.
- The highest negative anomalies are expected over central to southern Pakistan. In contrast, near-normal to slightly above-normal rainfall is anticipated over the northern parts of the country.
- Above-normal temperatures across most parts of the country during September 2026. The highest probabilities are likely to prevail over central Punjab.



POSSIBLE IMPACTS

- Dry conditions are much supportive for harvesting particularly for cotton and peanut.
 - The reduced rainfall may fail to fulfill irrigation needs for seasonal vegetables and growing Kharif crops, particularly in Punjab, requiring supplemental irrigation.
 - Despite below-normal rainfall, isolated heavy downpours during the start of the season may still trigger flash flooding in mountainous areas of Punjab, urban flooding in big metropolitan areas and hill torrents in southern Punjab.
 - Above normal temperature along with rainfall spell may enhance probability flash floods, and landslides in mountainous and other vulnerable areas particularly during first half of the month
 - Spatial temperature gradient may cause strong winds, dust storms, and thunderstorm and hailstorms which may affect seasonal crops, vegetables, and orchards; farmers are advised to take precautionary measures to protect standing crops.
 - Dengue outbreaks are possible in flood-affected and poorly drained areas, particularly in urban and low lying regions of the country
- **Advisory for general public:**
- Farmers are advised to visit PDMA & PMD advisories on website before irrigation or harvesting.
 - Travelers and tourists are advised to remain cautious while travelling during rainfall events.
