



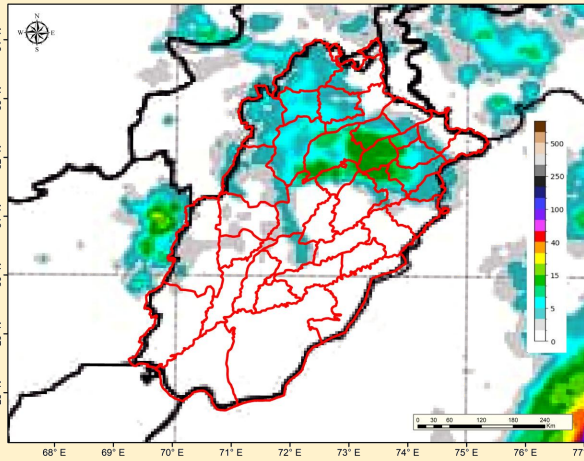

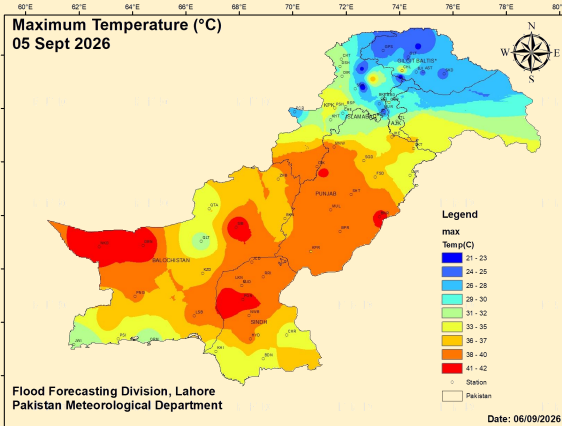


LAST 24 HOURS WEATHER SITUATION

Maximum Temperatures recorded in last 24 hours

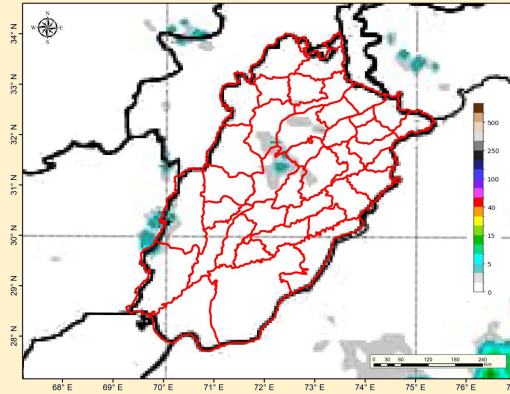

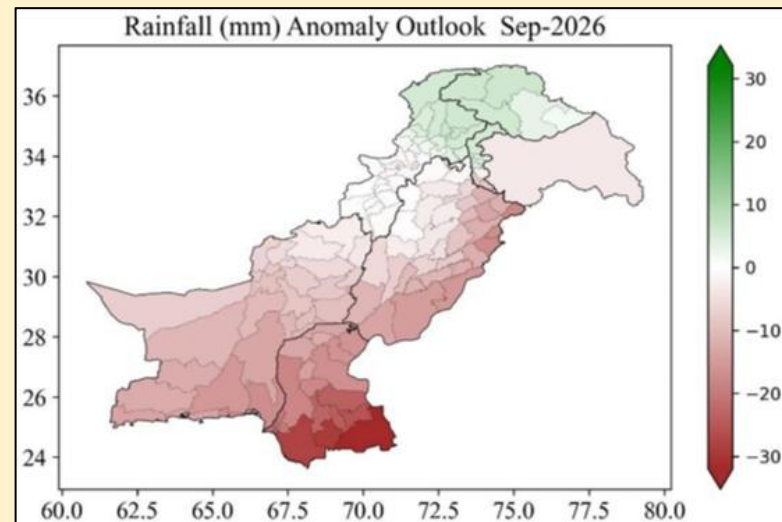

As per 0600 Hrs FFD Report:

- River Indus at Kalabagh and Taunsa is at LOW FLOOD Level
- All the other Rivers are flowing within normal limits.

MONTHLY RAINFALL OUTLOOK - SEPTEMBER



According to Met Department;

- Below-normal rainfall is expected over most parts of the country during September 2026.
- The highest negative anomalies are expected over central to southern Pakistan.
- In contrast, near-normal to slightly above-normal rainfall is anticipated over the northern parts of the country.
- Above-normal temperatures across most parts of the country during September 2026.
- The highest probabilities are likely to prevail over central Punjab,

POSSIBLE IMPACTS

- **Dry conditions** are much **supportive for harvesting** particularly for cotton and peanut.
 - The reduced rainfall may **fail to fulfill irrigation needs** for seasonal vegetables and growing Kharif crops, particularly in Punjab, requiring supplemental irrigation.
 - Despite below-normal rainfall, **isolated heavy downpours** during the start of the season may still **trigger flash flooding** in **mountainous areas of Punjab**, **urban flooding in big metropolitan areas** and **hill torrents in southern Punjab**
 - **Above normal temperature** along with rainfall spell may enhance probability of **flash floods**, and **landslides** in **mountainous and other vulnerable areas** particularly during first half of the month.
 - **Spatial temperature gradient** may cause strong winds, dust storms, and thunderstorm and hailstorms which may affect seasonal crops, vegetables, and orchards; farmers are advised to take **precautionary measures to protect standing crops**.
 - **Dengue outbreaks** are possible in **flood-affected and poorly drained areas**, particularly in urban and lowlying regions of the country.
- **Advisory for general public:**
- Farmers are advised to visit PDMA & PMD advisories on website before irrigation or harvesting.
 - Travelers and tourists are advised to remain cautious while travelling during rainfall events.
