



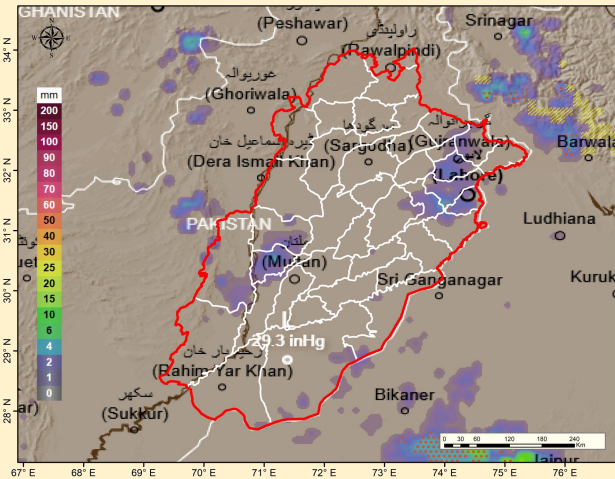

MAXIMUM PRECIPITATION (mm) LAST 24 HOURS

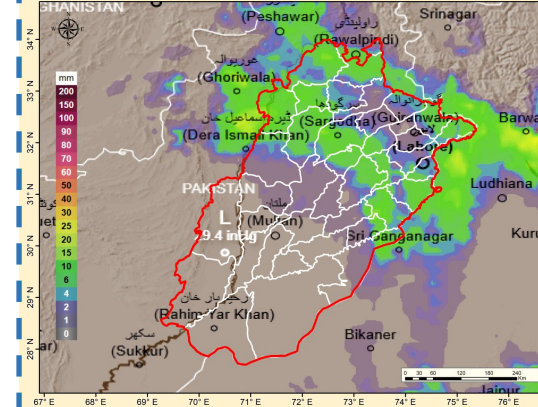

MAXIMUM PRECIPITATION (mm) NEXT 24 HOURS

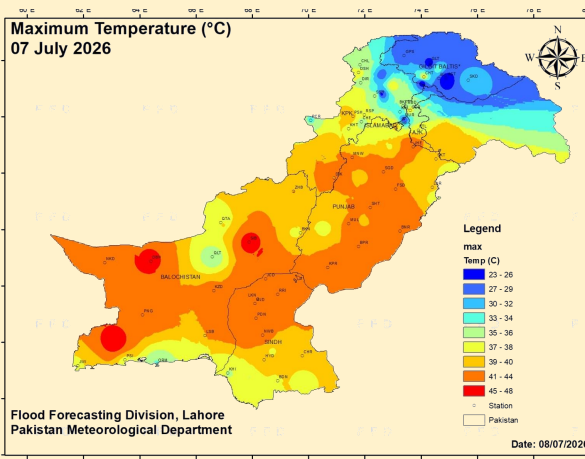


WEATHER FORECAST (24 HOURS)

Isolated rain-wind/thundershower is expected in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galiyat, Attock, Chakwal, Jhelum, Mandi Bahaiddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Hafizabad, Wazirabad, Faisalabad, Khushab, Sargodha, Lahore, Sheikhpura, Sialkot, Narowal, Okara, Kasur.
- Isolated rain-wind/thundershower is also expected in Sahiwal, Noorpur Thal, Bhakkar, Layyah, Mianwali, Pakpattan, Bahawalnagar, Dera Ghazi Khan and Bahawalpur during evening/night.

WEATHER ADVISORY - MONSOON

RAIN WINDSTORM/THUNDERSHOWERS PREDICTED IN UPPER/CENTRAL PARTS DURING NEXT 2 DAYS

Met office has informed that moist currents from the Arabian Sea are continuously penetrating the upper parts of the country, while moist currents from the Bay of Bengal are also expected to enter northeastern parts from today (evening/night). Meanwhile, a westerly wave is likely to approach upper parts of the country in next 12 hours. However seasonal low lies north-west Balochistan. Under the influence of this weather system:

- **Scattered rain windstorm/thundershower (with isolated heavyfalls)** is expected in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galliyat, Attock, Chakwal, Jhelum, Mandi Bahauddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Hafizabad, Wazirabad, Faisalabad, Khushab, Sargodha, Lahore, Sheikhupura, Sialkot, Narowal, Sahiwal, Jhang, Toba Tek Singh, Nankana Sahib, Chiniot, Okara, Kasur from 6th (evening/night) to **8th July**, while in Noor Pur Thal, Bhakkar, Mianwali, Layyah, Bahawalpur, Bahawalnagar, D.G. Khan, Multan, Khanewal, Lodhran, Muzaffargarh, Kot Addu, Rahim Yar Khan and Rajanpur on **7th & 8th July** with occasional gaps..

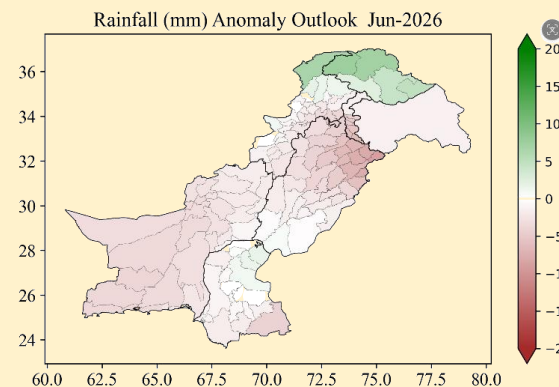
IMPACTS & PREVENTIVE MEASURES

- Windstorm & lightning **may damage weak structures** (solar panels, electric poles, bill boards etc.) during the forecast period.
- **Water flow may increase** in the **hill torrents of DG Khan and nullahs** originated from Kashmir on **7th & 8th July**.
- Heavy rains may cause **localized Urban flooding** in Rawalpindi, Gujranwala, Lahore and Faisalabad on **7th & 8th July**.
- Tourists and travelers are advised to **remain extra cautious** and **avoid unnecessary travelling** during the forecast period.
- Farmers are advised to **manage their crop activities** keeping in view the weather conditions and take care of their livestock as well.
- **Prevailing hot and humid conditions are likely to subside** during the forecast period

MONTHLY RAINFALL OUTLOOK - JUNE

According to Met Department;

- Near-normal to slightly below-normal rainfall is largely anticipated across the country during June 2026, with the most pronounced negative anomalies expected over northeastern Punjab.
- In contrast, Normal rainfall is likely over the southern regions of Punjab
- Overall, rainfall is expected to exhibit considerable spatial variability.



POSSIBLE IMPACTS

- **Below-normal rainfall** is likely to **reduce water availability**, increasing reliance on stored water and groundwater for agriculture.
- The **reduced rainfall** may fail to fulfill irrigation needs for seasonal vegetables and growing Kharif crops in Punjab, **requiring supplemental irrigation**.
- **Above-normal temperatures** may cause **heat stress** on newly sown and early-stage Kharif crops; timely irrigation management is advised to minimize potential losses.
- **Elevated temperatures** over northern areas of country are likely to **accelerate snowmelt**, while slightly above-normal rainfall may further exacerbate the situation, increasing the **risk of flash floods** and landslides in mountainous and flood-prone areas.
- **Despite below-normal rainfall**, isolated heavy downpours may still trigger localized **urban flooding** in major cities, particularly in poorly drained and low-lying areas.
- **Spatial temperature gradient** may cause strong winds, dust storms, and hailstorms which may affect seasonal crops, vegetables, and orchards; farmers are advised to take precautionary measures to protect standing crops.
