



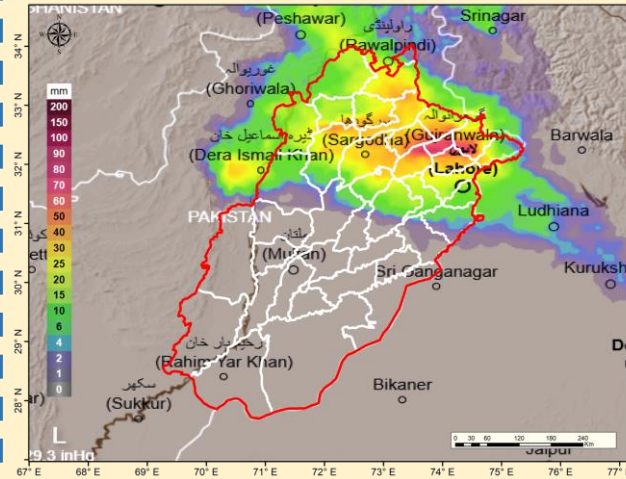

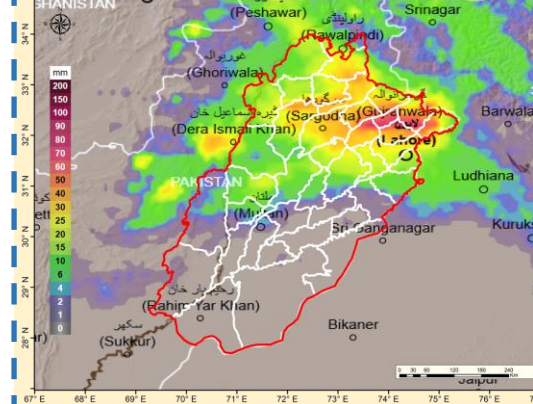

- **Scattered rain-windstorm/thundershower (with isolated heavyfalls at times very heavy)** is expected in **Rawalpindi, Murree, Galiyat, Attock, Chakwal, Mianwali, Jhelum, Mandi Bahauddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Hafizabad, Wazirabad, Lahore, Sheikhupura, Sialkot, Narowal, Sahiwal, Khushab, Noorpur Thal, Sargodha, Nankana Sahib, Chinot, and Okara.**
- **However, rain-windstorm/thundershower may occur at isolated places in Faisalabad, Jhang, Toba Tek Singh, Bhakkar, Layyah, Bahawalnagar, Dera Ghazi Khan and Multan.**

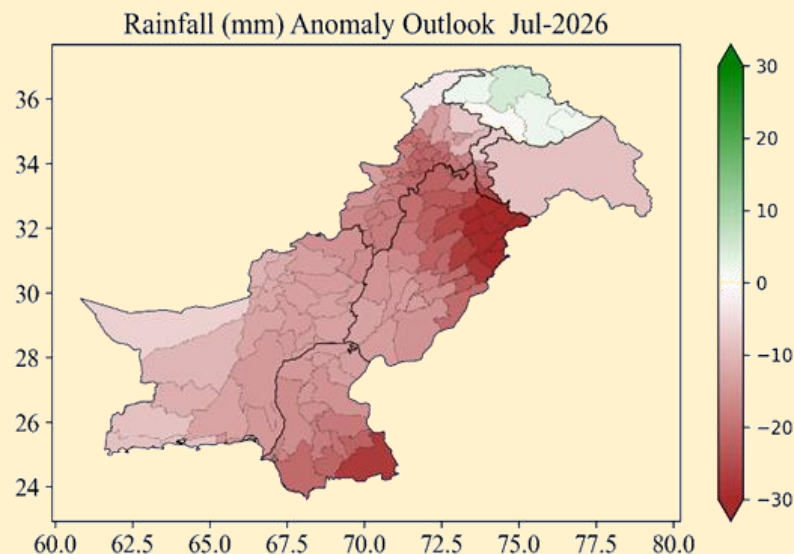

MONTHLY RAINFALL OUTLOOK - JULY



According to Met Department;

- Below-normal rainfall is largely anticipated across the country during July 2026, with the most pronounced negative anomalies expected over northeastern Punjab.
- Mean temperatures are expected to remain above normal* nationwide, with maximum departure over eastern Gilgit-Baltistan, and central to northeastern Punjab in July 2026.
- The likelihood of warmer-than-normal conditions is particularly high over southern Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, most of Punjab and Balochistan.

POSSIBLE IMPACTS

- **Below-normal rainfall** is likely to **reduce water availability**, increasing reliance on stored water and groundwater for agriculture. ☹️
- The reduced rainfall **may fail to fulfill irrigation needs** for seasonal vegetables and growing Kharif crops, particularly in Punjab, requiring supplemental irrigation. ☹️
- Prolonged intermittent gaps between the rainfall spells could significantly **increase the potential for heat stress**, especially over the plain areas of Punjab. ☹️☹️
- Despite below-normal rainfall, **isolated heavy downpours may still trigger flash flooding** in mountainous areas of Punjab, urban flooding in big metropolitan areas and hill torrents in southern Punjab. ☹️
- **Spatial temperature gradient** may cause strong winds, dust storms, and thunderstorm and hailstorms which may affect seasonal crops, vegetables, and orchards; farmers are advised to take **precautionary measures to protect standing crops**.

➤ **Advisory for general public:** ☹️

- The public is advised to **avoid prolonged outdoor exposure**, particularly between 11:00 AM and 4:00 PM.
- **Stay well hydrated**, wear light and loose-fitting clothing, and seek shade or cool indoor environments whenever possible.
- Elderly people, children, and outdoor workers should **take extra precautions to minimize the risk of heat-related illnesses**.
