



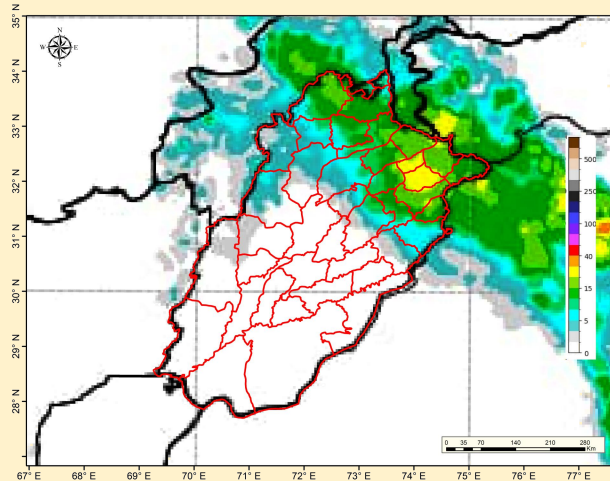

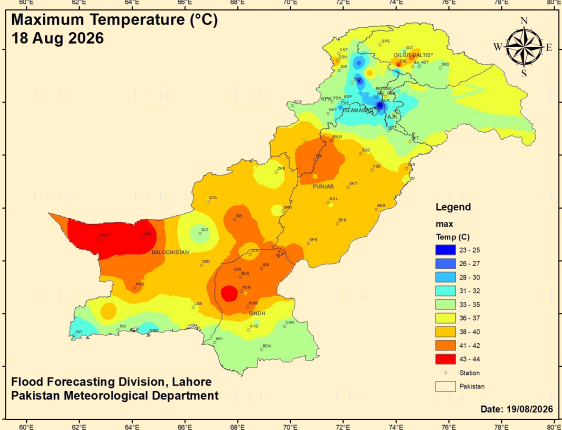


LAST 24 HOURS WEATHER SITUATION

Maximum Temperatures recorded in last 24 hours

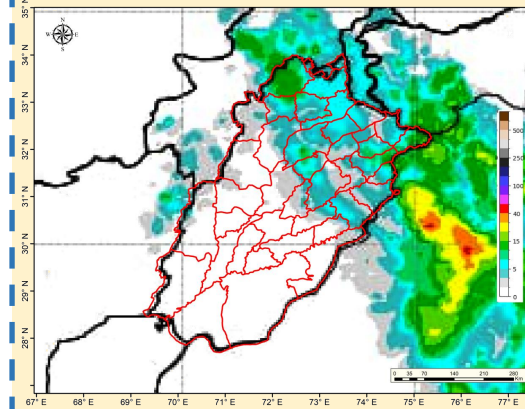

- **Hot and humid weather** is expected in most districts of the province with **rain-wind/thundershower** expected in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galiyat, Attock, Chakwal, Tala Gang, Gujrat, Jhelum, Mangla, Gujranwala, Hafizabad, Mandi Bahauddin, Sialkot, Narowal, Lahore, Kasur, Sheikhupura, Okara, Sargodha, Mianwali and Faisalabad.
- **Isolated heavyfalls** are also likely in Potohar region, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Mandi Bahauddin, Sialkot, Narowal, Lahore and Sheikhupura during the period.

WEATHER ADVISORY - MONSOON

MORE RAIN-WIND/THUNDERSHOWER PREDICTED IN UPPER AND CENTRAL PARTS OF THE COUNTRY FROM 17TH TO 21ST AUGUST WITH OCCASIONAL GAPS

Met office has informed that monsoon currents are penetrating upper parts of the country and is likely to continue in coming days. A westerly wave is likely to enter in upper parts of the country from 17th August. Under the influence of this weather system

- Rain-wind/thundershower (with isolated heavyfalls) is expected in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galliyat, Jhelum, Chakwal, Talagang, Attock, Sialkot, Narowal, Mandi Bahauddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Hafizabad, Wazirabad, Lahore, Kasur, Okara, Sheikhupura, Nankana Sahib, Sargodha, Khushab, Mianwali and Noorpur Thal from 16th (evening/night) to 21st August with occasional gaps. While in Faisalabad, Jhang, Toba Tek Singh, Layyah, Bhakkar, Sahiwal, Pakpattan, Bahawalnagar, Bahawalpur, D.G. Khan on 20th and 21st August.

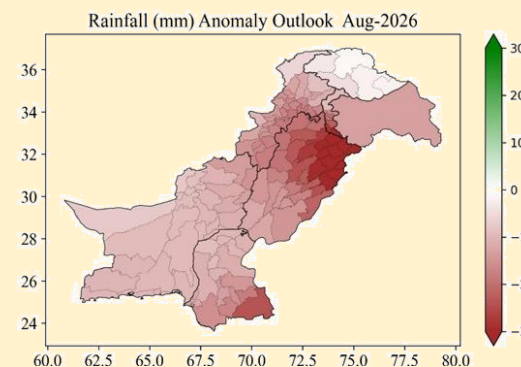
IMPACTS & PREVENTIVE MEASURES

- Heavy rains may cause Urban flooding in low lying areas of Rawalpindi, Gujranwala, Gujrat, Sialkot and Lahore from 17th to 20th August.
- Landslides may occur in vulnerable areas of Murree and Galliyat during the forecast period.
- Tourists and travelers are advised to remain cautious during the forecast period.
- Farmers are advised to manage their crop activities keeping in view the weather conditions and take care of their livestock as well.

MONTHLY RAINFALL OUTLOOK - AUGUST

According to Met Department;

- Below-normal rainfall is expected over most parts of the country during August 2026. The strongest negative rainfall anomalies are projected over northeastern and central Punjab.
- Mean temperatures are expected to remain above normal nationwide, with maximum departure over central to northeastern Punjab.



POSSIBLE IMPACTS

- Below-normal rainfall is likely to reduce water availability, increasing reliance on stored water and groundwater for agriculture.
 - The reduced rainfall may fail to fulfill irrigation needs for seasonal vegetables and growing Kharif crops, particularly in Punjab, requiring supplemental irrigation.
 - Despite below-normal rainfall, isolated heavy downpours may still trigger flash flooding in mountainous areas of Punjab, urban flooding in big metropolitan areas and hill torrents in southern Punjab.
 - Prolonged intermittent gaps between the rainfall spells could significantly increase the potential for heat stress, especially over the plain areas of Punjab.
 - Despite below-normal rainfall, isolated heavy downpours may still trigger flash flooding in mountainous areas of Punjab, urban flooding in big metropolitan areas and hill torrents in southern Punjab.
 - Spatial temperature gradient may cause strong winds, dust storms, and thunderstorm and hailstorms which may affect seasonal crops, vegetables, and orchards; farmers are advised to take precautionary measures to protect standing crops.
- **Advisory for general public:**
- Farmers are advised to visit PDMA & PMD advisories on website before irrigation or harvesting.
 - Travelers and tourists are advised to remain cautious while travelling during rainfall events.
