



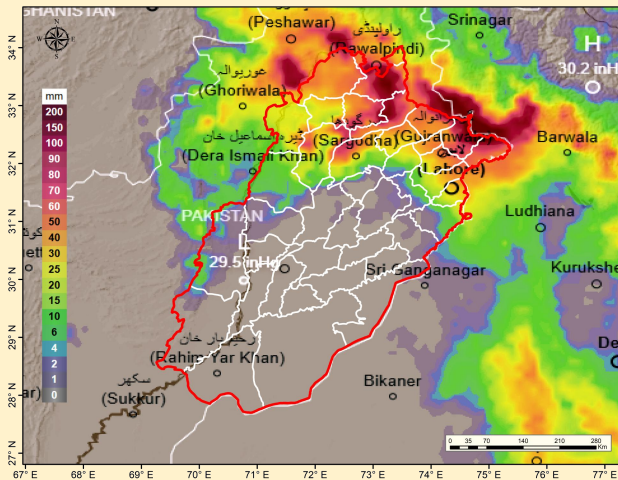

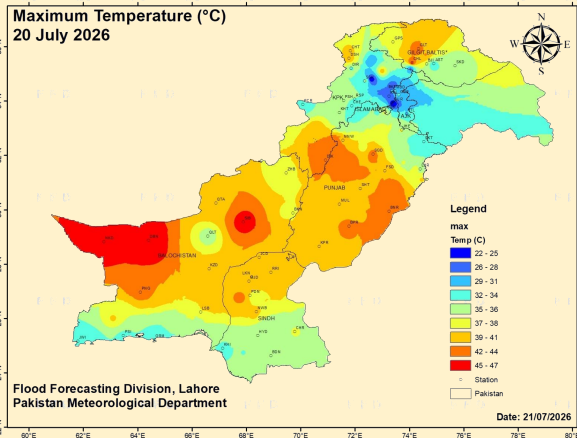


LAST 24 HOURS WEATHER SITUATION

Maximum Temperatures recorded in last 24 hours

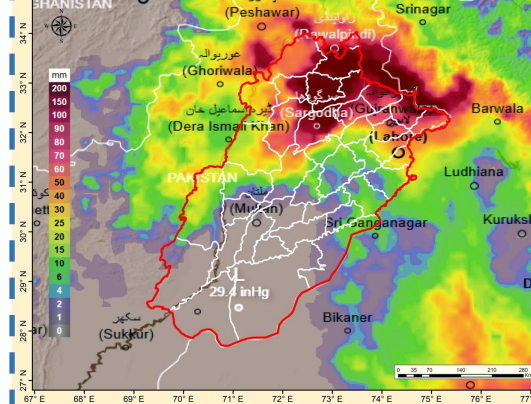

- Widespread intermittent rain-windstorm/ thunder showers (with isolated heavyfalls) is likely in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galliyat, Attock, Chakwal, Jhelum, Mandi Bahauddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Hafizabad, Wazirabad, Faisalabad, Khushab, Sargodha, Lahore, Kasur, Sheikhupura, Sialkot, Narowal, Sahiwal, Jhang, Toba Tek Singh, Nankana Sahib, Chiniot, Okara, Noor Pur Thal, Bhakkar, Mianwali, Layyah, Bahawalpur, Bahawalnagar, Dera Ghazi Khan, Kot Addu, Taunsa, Multan, Khanewal, Lodhran, Muzaffargarh, Kot Addu, Rahim Yar Khan and Rajanpur. Heavyfalls (at times very heavy) may also occur at few places during the period.

WEATHER ADVISORY - MONSOON

RAIN WINDSTORM/THUNDERSHOWERS PREDICTED IN PROVINCE IN COMING DAYS

Met office has informed that monsoon currents from the Arabian Sea are continuously penetrating the upper and central parts of the country and likely to strengthen on weekend. Meanwhile, a western disturbance is also likely to approach upper parts on Monday. Under the influence of this weather system:

➤ Rain windstorm/thundershower (with scattered heavyfalls at times very heavy) is expected in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galliyat, Attock, Chakwal, Jhelum, Mandi Bahauddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Hafizabad, Wazirabad, Faisalabad, Khushab, Sargodha, Lahore, Sheikhupura, Sialkot, Narowal, Sahiwal, Jhang, Toba Tek Singh, Nankana Sahib, Chiniot, Okara, from 19th (evening/night) to 23rd July while in Noor Pur Thal, Bhakkar, Mianwali, Layyah, Bahawalpur, Bahawalnagar, D.G. Khan, Multan, Khanewal, Lodhran, Muzaffargarh, Kot Addu, Rahim Yar Khan and Rajanpur from 20th to 24th July with occasional gaps.

➤ Heavyfalls is also expected during the period

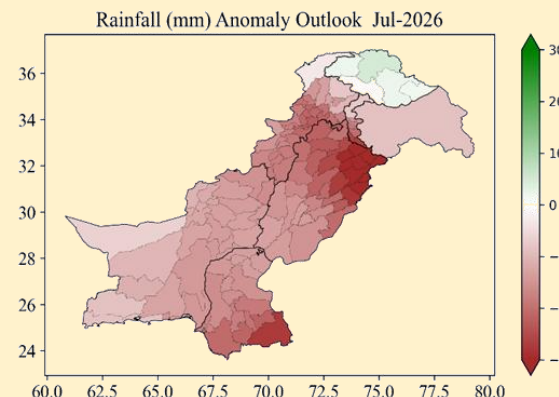
IMPACTS & PREVENTIVE MEASURES

- Windstorm & lightning may damage weak structures (solar panels, electric poles, bill boards etc.) during the forecast period.
- Landslides may occur in vulnerable areas of Murree & Galliyat during 20th & 25th July.
- Flash flooding in local streams and Nullahs of Kashmir, Murree & Galliyat, Northeastern Punjab, hill torrents of DG Khan during the wet spell.
- Heavy rains may cause Urban flooding in Rawalpindi, Gujranwala, Lahore, Sialkot, Multan and Faisalabad from 20th to 23rd July.
- Tourists and travelers are advised to remain extra cautious and avoid unnecessary travelling during the forecast period.
- Farmers are advised to manage their crop activities keeping in view the weather conditions and take care of their livestock as well.
- Prevailing hot and humid conditions are likely to subside during the forecast period.

MONTHLY RAINFALL OUTLOOK - JULY

According to Met Department;

- Below-normal rainfall is largely anticipated across the country during July 2026, with the most pronounced negative anomalies expected over northeastern Punjab.
- Mean temperatures are expected to remain above normal* nationwide, with maximum departure over eastern Gilgit-Baltistan, and central to northeastern Punjab in July 2026.
- The likelihood of warmer-than-normal conditions is particularly high over most of Punjab.



POSSIBLE IMPACTS

- Below-normal rainfall is likely to reduce water availability, increasing reliance on stored water and groundwater for agriculture.
 - The reduced rainfall may fail to fulfill irrigation needs for seasonal vegetables and growing Kharif crops, particularly in Punjab, requiring supplemental irrigation.
 - Prolonged intermittent gaps between the rainfall spells could significantly increase the potential for heat stress, especially over the plain areas of Punjab.
 - Despite below-normal rainfall, isolated heavy downpours may still trigger flash flooding in mountainous areas of Punjab, urban flooding in big metropolitan areas and hill torrents in southern Punjab.
 - Spatial temperature gradient may cause strong winds, dust storms, and thunderstorm and hailstorms which may affect seasonal crops, vegetables, and orchards; farmers are advised to take precautionary measures to protect standing crops.
- **Advisory for general public:**
- The public is advised to avoid prolonged outdoor exposure, particularly between 11:00 AM and 4:00 PM.
 - Stay well hydrated, wear light and loose-fitting clothing, and seek shade or cool indoor environments whenever possible.
 - Elderly people, children, and outdoor workers should take extra precautions to minimize the risk of heat-related illnesses.
