



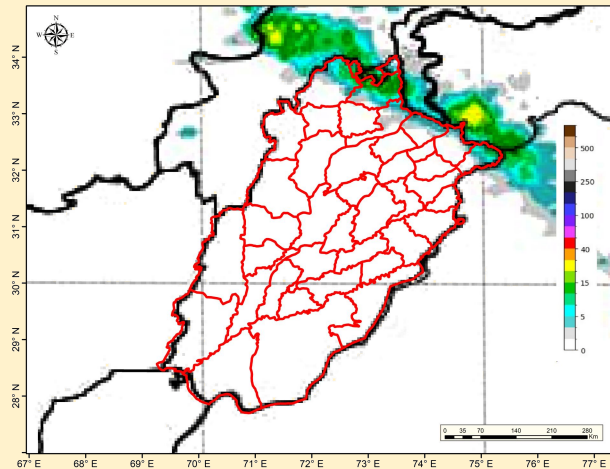

MAXIMUM PRECIPITATION (mm) LAST 24 HOURS

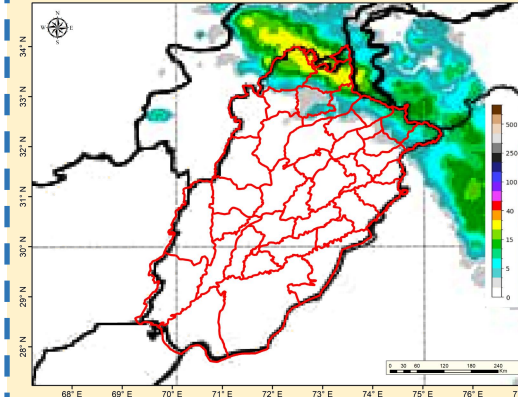


Average Rainfall (mm) recorded (last 24 Hours)

MAXIMUM PRECIPITATION (mm) NEXT 24 HOURS

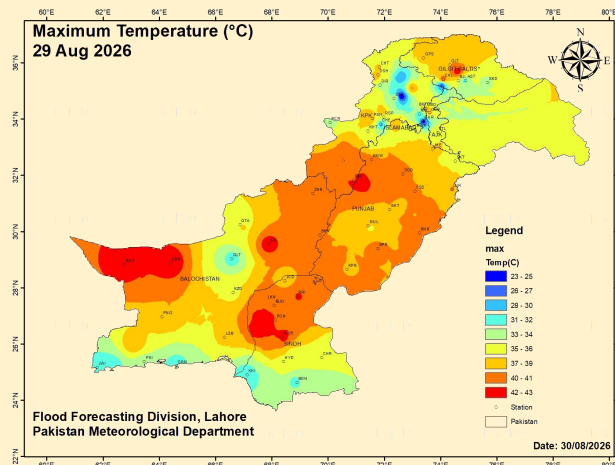


WEATHER FORECAST (24 HOURS)

WEATHER ADVISORY - MONSOON

RAIN-WIND/THUNDER SHOWER PREDICTED IN THE UPPER PARTS OF THE COUNTRY

According to MET Department, Monsoon currents are penetrating upper of the country. A westerly wave is also likely to approach upper parts of the country from 31st August and may persist till 5th September. Under the influence of this weather system:

- Rain-wind/thundershower (with isolated heavyfalls) is expected in Rawalpindi, Murree, Galliyat, Jhelum, Chakwal, Talagang, Attock, Lahore, Sialkot, Sheikhpura, Narowal, Mandi Bahauddin, Gujrat, Gujranwala, Wazirabad and Hafizabad from 29th August to 5th September, while in Kasur, Okara, Nankana Sahib, Sargodha, Khushab, Mianwali, Noorpur Thal, Faisalabad, Jhang, Toba Tek Singh, Layyah, Bhakkar, Sahiwal and Pakpattan from 1st September to 5th September with occasional gaps.

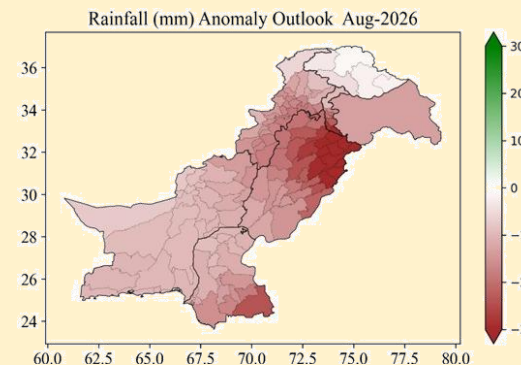
IMPACTS & PREVENTIVE MEASURES

- Heavy rains may cause Urban flooding in low lying areas of Rawalpindi, Gujranwala, Gujrat, Sialkot and Lahore from 31st August to 5th September.
- Heavy rain may cause flash flooding in local streams/ Nullahs in Kashmir, Murree, Galliyat, and Rawalpindi during the forecast period.
- Landslides may occur in hilly areas of Murree and Galliyat during the forecast period.
- Tourists and travelers are advised to remain cautious during the forecast period.
- Farmers are advised to manage their crop activities keeping in view the weather conditions.

MONTHLY RAINFALL OUTLOOK - AUGUST

According to Met Department;

- Below-normal rainfall is expected over most parts of the country during August 2026. The strongest negative rainfall anomalies are projected over northeastern and central Punjab.
- Mean temperatures are expected to remain above normal nationwide, with maximum departure over central to northeastern Punjab.



POSSIBLE IMPACTS

- Below-normal rainfall is likely to reduce water availability, increasing reliance on stored water and groundwater for agriculture.
 - The reduced rainfall may fail to fulfill irrigation needs for seasonal vegetables and growing Kharif crops, particularly in Punjab, requiring supplemental irrigation.
 - Despite below-normal rainfall, isolated heavy downpours may still trigger flash flooding in mountainous areas of Punjab, urban flooding in big metropolitan areas and hill torrents in southern Punjab.
 - Prolonged intermittent gaps between the rainfall spells could significantly increase the potential for heat stress, especially over the plain areas of Punjab.
 - Despite below-normal rainfall, isolated heavy downpours may still trigger flash flooding in mountainous areas of Punjab, urban flooding in big metropolitan areas and hill torrents in southern Punjab.
 - Spatial temperature gradient may cause strong winds, dust storms, and thunderstorm and hailstorms which may affect seasonal crops, vegetables, and orchards; farmers are advised to take precautionary measures to protect standing crops.
- Advisory for general public:
- Farmers are advised to visit PDMA & PMD advisories on website before irrigation or harvesting.
 - Travelers and tourists are advised to remain cautious while travelling during rainfall events.
